




#### **TEST CIRCUIT 2 SWITCHING TIME**





# DERATING FACTOR OF FORWARD BIAS SAFE OPERATING AREA




# TOTAL POWER DISSIPATION vs. CASE TEMPERATURE












DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT

 $\rm T_{ch}$  - Channel Temperature -  $^{\circ}\rm C$ 










# DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. CHANNEL TEMPERATURE





#### SOURCE TO DRAIN DIODE FORWARD VOLTAGE




#### CAPACITANCE vs. DRAIN TO SOURCE VOLTAGE



#### DYNAMIC INPUT/OUTPUT CHARACTERISTICS




# REVERSE RECOVERY TIME vs. DRAIN CURRENT





# **Equivalent Circuit**



Remark: Strong electric field, when exposed to this device, can cause destruction of the gate oxide and ultimately degrade the device operation. Steps must be taken to stop generation of static electricity as much as possible, and quickly dissipate it once, when it has occurred.
