In order to optimize performance for battery operated portable applications, the NCP103 employs the dynamic quiescent current adjustment for very low $\rm I_Q$ consumption at no–load.




Figure 1. Typical Application Schematic







Pin No.	Pin Name	Description
1	OUT	Regulated output voltage pin. A small ceramic capacitor with minimum value of 1 μF is needed from this pin to ground to assure stability.
2	GND	Power supply ground.
3	EN	Driving EN over 0.9 V turns on the regulator. Driving EN below 0.4 V puts the regulator into shutdown mode.
4	IN	Input pin. A small capacitor is needed from this pin to ground to assure stability.




Figure 3. Output Voltage vs. Temperature $V_{OUT} = 1.2 \text{ V}$

Figure 4. Output Voltage vs. Temperature $V_{OUT} = 2.8 \text{ V}$




Figure 5. Quiescent Current vs. Input Voltage

Figure 6. Ground Current vs. Output Current




Figure 7. Ground Current vs. Temperature

Figure 8. Line Regulation vs. Output Current $V_{OUT} = 1.2 \text{ V}$




Figure 9. Line Regulation vs. Temperature $V_{OUT} = 2.8 \text{ V}$




Figure 10. Load Regulation vs. Temperature $V_{OUT} = 1.2 \text{ V}$




Figure 11. Load Regulation vs. Temperature $V_{OUT} = 2.8 \text{ V}$




Figure 12. Dropout Voltage vs. Output Current V_{OUT} = 2.8 V




Figure 13. Dropout Voltage vs. Temperature






Figure 14. Current Limit vs. Temperature

Figure 16. Short-Circuit Current vs. Input Voltage






Figure 17. Enable Voltage Threshold vs. Temperature

Temperature






Figure 19. Disable Current vs. Temperature





Figure 22. Output Voltage Noise Spectral Density for V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, C_{OUT} = 4.7 μF




Figure 23. Power Supply Rejection Ratio, V_{OUT} = 1.2 V, C_{OUT} = 1 μF

Figure 24. Power Supply Rejection Ratio, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, C_{OUT} = 4.7 μF




Figure 25. Output Capacitor ESR vs. Output Current




Figure 26. Enable Turn-on Response, $C_{OUT} = 1 \ \mu F, \ I_{OUT} = 1 \ mA$




Figure 27. Enable Turn-on Response, $C_{OUT} = 1 \mu F$, $I_{OUT} = 150 mA$




Figure 28. Enable Turn-on Response, $C_{OUT} = 4.7 \; \mu F, \, I_{OUT} = 1 \; mA$




Figure 29. Enable Turn-on Response, C_{OUT} = 4.7 $\mu F,\,I_{OUT}$ = 150 mA




Figure 30. Line Transient Response – Rising Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA




Figure 31. Line Transient Response – Falling Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA




Figure 32. Line Transient Response – Rising Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 150 mA




Figure 33. Line Transient Response – Falling Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 150 mA




Figure 34. Load Transient Response – Rising Edge, V_{OUT} = 1.2 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, C_{OUT} = 1 μ F, 4.7 μ F




Figure 35. Load Transient Response – Falling Edge, V_{OUT} = 1.2 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, C_{OUT} = 1 μ F, 4.7 μ F




Figure 36. Load Transient Response – Rising Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, C_{OUT} = 1 μ F, 4.7 μ F




Figure 37. Load Transient Response – Falling Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, C_{OUT} = 1 μ F, 4.7 μ F




Figure 38. Load Transient Response – Rising Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, V_{IN} = 3.8 V, 5.5 V




Figure 40. Turn-on/off - Slow Rising V_{IN}




Figure 39. Load Transient Response – Falling Edge, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V, I_{OUT} = 1 mA to 150 mA, V_{IN} = 3.8 V, 5.5 V




Figure 41. Short-Circuit and Thermal Shutdown

APPLICATIONS INFORMATION

General

The NCP103 is a high performance 150 mA Low Dropout Linear Regulator. This device delivers very high PSRR (over 75 dB at 1 kHz) and excellent dynamic performance as load/line transients. In connection with very low quiescent current this device is very suitable for various battery powered applications such as tablets, cellular phones, wireless and many others. The device is fully protected in case of output overload, output short circuit condition and overheating, assuring a very robust design.

Input Capacitor Selection (CIN)

It is recommended to connect at least a 1µF Ceramic X5R or X7R capacitor as close as possible to the IN pin of the device. This capacitor will provide a low impedance path for unwanted AC signals or noise modulated onto constant input voltage. There is no requirement for the min. /max. ESR of the input capacitor but it is recommended to use ceramic capacitors for their low ESR and ESL. A good input capacitor will limit the influence of input trace inductance and source resistance during sudden load current changes. Larger input capacitor may be necessary if fast and large load transients are encountered in the application.

Output Decoupling (COUT)

The NCP103 requires an output capacitor connected as close as possible to the output pin of the regulator. The recommended capacitor value is 1 μF and X7R or X5R dielectric due to its low capacitance variations over the specified temperature range. The NCP103 is designed to remain stable with minimum effective capacitance of 0.22 μF to account for changes with temperature, DC bias and package size. Especially for small package size capacitors such as 0402 the effective capacitance drops rapidly with the applied DC bias.

There is no requirement for the minimum value of Equivalent Series Resistance (ESR) for the C_{OUT} but the maximum value of ESR should be less than 3 Ω . Larger output capacitors and lower ESR could improve the load transient response or high frequency PSRR. It is not recommended to use tantalum capacitors on the output due to their large ESR. The equivalent series resistance of tantalum capacitors is also strongly dependent on the temperature, increasing at low temperature.

Enable Operation

The NCP103 uses the EN pin to enable/disable its device and to deactivate/activate the active discharge function.

If the EN pin voltage is <0.4 V the device is guaranteed to be disabled. The pass transistor is turned—off so that there is virtually no current flow between the IN and OUT. The active discharge transistor is active so that the output voltage V_{OUT} is pulled to GND through a 100 Ω resistor. In the

disable state the device consumes as low as typ. 10 nA from the $V_{\mbox{\scriptsize IN}}.$

If the EN pin voltage >0.9 V the device is guaranteed to be enabled. The NCP103 regulates the output voltage and the active discharge transistor is turned-off.

The EN pin has internal pull-down current source with typ. value of 300 nA which assures that the device is turned-off when the EN pin is not connected. In the case where the EN function isn't required the EN should be tied directly to IN.

Output Current Limit

Output Current is internally limited within the IC to a typical 550 mA. The NCP103 will source this amount of current measured with a voltage drops on the 90% of the nominal V_{OUT} . If the Output Voltage is directly shorted to ground ($V_{OUT} = 0$ V), the short circuit protection will limit the output current to 580 mA (typ). The current limit and short circuit protection will work properly over whole temperature range and also input voltage range. There is no limitation for the short circuit duration.

Thermal Shutdown

When the die temperature exceeds the Thermal Shutdown threshold (T_{SD} – 160°C typical), Thermal Shutdown event is detected and the device is disabled. The IC will remain in this state until the die temperature decreases below the Thermal Shutdown Reset threshold (T_{SDU} – 140°C typical). Once the IC temperature falls below the 140°C the LDO is enabled again. The thermal shutdown feature provides the protection from a catastrophic device failure due to accidental overheating. This protection is not intended to be used as a substitute for proper heat sinking.

Power Dissipation

As power dissipated in the NCP103 increases, it might become necessary to provide some thermal relief. The maximum power dissipation supported by the device is dependent upon board design and layout. Mounting pad configuration on the PCB, the board material, and the ambient temperature affect the rate of junction temperature rise for the part.

The maximum power dissipation the NCP103 can handle is given by:

$$\mathsf{P}_{\mathsf{D}(\mathsf{MAX})} = \frac{\left[125^{\circ}\mathsf{C} - \mathsf{T}_{\mathsf{A}}\right]}{\theta_{\mathsf{JA}}} \tag{eq. 1}$$

The power dissipated by the NCP103 for given application conditions can be calculated from the following equations:

$$P_{D} \approx V_{IN} (I_{GND}@I_{OUT}) + I_{OUT} (V_{IN} - V_{OUT}) \qquad \text{(eq. 2)}$$




Figure 42. θ_{JA} vs. Copper Area (uDFN4)

Reverse Current

The PMOS pass transistor has an inherent body diode which will be forward biased in the case that $V_{OUT} > V_{IN}$. Due to this fact in cases, where the extended reverse current condition can be anticipated the device may require additional external protection.

Power Supply Rejection Ratio

The NCP103 features very good Power Supply Rejection ratio. If desired the PSRR at higher frequencies in the range $100~\rm kHz-10~MHz$ can be tuned by the selection of C_{OUT} capacitor and proper PCB layout.

Turn-On Time

The turn-on time is defined as the time period from EN assertion to the point in which V_{OUT} will reach 98% of its

nominal value. This time is dependent on various application conditions such as $V_{OUT(NOM)},\,C_{OUT}$ and $T_A.$ For example typical value for V_{OUT} = 1.2 V, C_{OUT} = 1 $\mu F,\,I_{OUT}$ = 1 mA and T_A = 25°C is 90 $\mu s.$

PCB Layout Recommendations

To obtain good transient performance and good regulation characteristics place $C_{\rm IN}$ and $C_{\rm OUT}$ capacitors close to the device pins and make the PCB traces wide. In order to minimize the solution size, use 0402 capacitors. Larger copper area connected to the pins will also improve the device thermal resistance. The actual power dissipation can be calculated from the equation above (Equation 2). Expose pad should be tied the shortest path to the GND pin.






TOP VIEW
